He has also been published in multiple anthologies, including *The Letter* and *Black Like Us.* As a playwright and director, he has won awards and fellowships for works that include *This One Girl's Story, To the Light: A Celebration of the Friendship of James Baldwin and Painter Beauford Delaney,* and *Bloodsummer Rituals,* a play based on the life of poet Audre Lorde. He has been awarded the Millay Fellowship and Edward Albee Fellowship, and was selected to direct for the Obie Award-winning "48 Hours in Harlem" Festival.
